LET'S CONNECT AT NINESTAR'S ANNUAL MEETING

ooking for an evening filled with food, family-friendly fun, as well as the latest information on emerging

innovations and services? Then you'll want to save the date for NineStar Connect's Annual Meeting, which will be held on March 24, 2017 at Greenfield-Central High School. The entire membership is invited to take part in the festivities, which includes a catered dinner, workshops presented by NineStar experts and free childcare and entertainment for the 10 and under set.

"This is a very special event that we are proud to host every year and we can't wait for our members to see what we have in store for them," said NineStar Marketing Coordinator Christa Riggs.

Dinner will begin at 5 p.m. and will once again be provided by Jonathon Byrd's Catering, the official

catering company of the Indianapolis Colts. This year, the menu includes a choice of two entrees (chicken or fish) as well as mashed potatoes, corn, green beans, cole slaw and assorted desserts. Kids in attendance will be treated to pizza at their own party, which will include face painting, balloon animals

and a visit from Hedgehog Hannah, who will show off a collection of exotic animals including a wallaby, arctic fox and chameleon.

"There will be about 12 animals presented and there will be a few surprises in store for our guests that I can't share," Riggs said. "Over the past few years. we have separated the big kids from the little ones, but Hedgehog Hannah is the kind of entertainment all ages can enjoy. Last year we had 38 kids in attendance and we hope to have even more come out this year to see the menagerie."

While the kids head off to where the wild things are, grown ups will have the opportunity to learn about some of the latest products and services NineStar has to offer with two workshops

geared to help folks become acquainted with the newest innovative ideas.

"NineStar is perceived to be an innovative company and we are always working to expand our products and services in new and exciting ways," Riggs said. "That is the only way that we will remain progressive and these workshops allow the membership to hear about new products, meet with the experts who know all of the ins and outs and find out what kind of impact these products will have on their lives."

The first workshop is centered on NineStar's TV streaming service, which includes the Watch TV Everywhere app as well as accessibility to other streaming plans such as Netflix, Hulu and PlayStation (PS) Vue. Shira Dankner, NineStar's Network Operations Manager, says television viewing audiences are increasingly interested in ala carte programming and binge watching current favorites. This service will not only allow access to top-notch movies, but also enables them to watch favorite past and present television shows. as well as original content and live TV.

This service does not require a set top box to get started. It includes a DVR option and gives members more accessibility to broadband streams across the Internet. This service is not only limited

one's home TV, but is also accessible on the go through a smart phone and mobile app.

"We had a NineStar Nerds night on this product and it was amazing how many members didn't realize it was available to them," said Dankner "We hope this workshop will help spread awareness about the service and show what an added value it is to our membership."

The second workshop will highlight NineStar's Load Management programs, which can help members save

can help members save
money on their electric
bills, reduce their
carbon footprint
and afford the
co-op more
purchasing

power. Members who choose the Time-Of-Use program volunteer to shift their power use to off-peak hours of the day while those who sign up for the PowerShift program allow the co-op to cycle off their hot water heaters and/or central air conditioning systems during periods of high demand with a simple switch.

Ninestar Facilities and Special Programs Manager, Brad Henderson will present the workshop, which he says will highlight the benefits members will enjoy when they choose to take part in one of these programs. In addition to helping the co-op save money when purchasing electricity and doing something positive for the environment, those who switch to Time-Of-Use rates may see a 10-15 percent savings on their monthly bill while PowerShift participants can receive up to \$60 in rebates when they have the switch installed.

"Many of our members will remember when we had a similar program that started back in 1981," he said. "It's a pretty basic program that is designed to cycle off appliances for a short period of time during peak demands but in such a way that our members don't even realize that it is happening. The goal of the workshop is to minimize any concerns or fears that members may have and show how it can be a benefit to evervone."

In addition, members who attend the annual meeting will have the opportunity to vote on the new board of directors, listen as NineStar announces the winners of 15 scholarships of \$1,000 each and have the opportunity to win cash giveaways and door prizes as well.

"We really try to be creative and offer something different every year so that our membership stays engaged with the co-op and remains invested in what it is doing," says Riggs. "We want to continue expanding our products and services and we need membership feedback, so be sure to come out and be part of this very special event."




Another part of the co-op story I like to tell people who are new to the cooperative business model is that we are a non-profit
