to watch your TV programs, NineStar can help you not feel the pinch of growing your monthly bill. Please read on to find out ways you can still watch your favorite shows but on a less expensive budget.

PASSING THE BUCKS

Before exploring the various video options, it is important to understand why the price increases are happening and who profits from those fees. When a cable channel creates popular content, it costs the network more to produce. They have to pay the crew, the director, the actors, etc. and they find those funds via advertisers as well as passing a portion of the costs onto cable providers in order to give them access to that content.

Naturally, providers cannot afford to absorb that cost and they cannot merely drop the network because, in many cases, they would lose multiple channels in the bargain. Parent companies who own one popular channel typically own others as well and they negotiate the acceptance of those networks into their contract with cable providers. The only solution is to pass on that cost to the consumer. "We don't profit from

"We don't profit from our video content," says NineStar Vice President of Administration Regina Bever. "They set the price and we have to pay it. Our only option is to pass the cost on to members or drop the channels altogether."

STREAMING SERVICES MAKE SENSE

Dropping the channels may be the best option for members who are ready to go Over The Top (OTT) and bypass telecommunications, cable or broadcast services by purchasing their content via the Internet from the networks or streaming services. Access to televised content is controlled by the video distributor through their app or can be watched through a phone, computer, tablet or separate "box" that is independent of a cable provider. OTT plans are paid on a month-by-month basis and can be cancelled when a favorite show goes on hiatus in order to save money.

"Going OTT is not for the faint of heart because people are afraid of cutting the cord to their traditional method of getting their video content," says video producer John Painter. "The younger generation is particularly savvy about these new applications, but we have a diverse membership and we understand that some people may find such a change confusing and jarring. One of the biggest concerns among members is having

access to local channels, which were free when they were broadcast via airwaves. As these channels made the switch to digital, they became contentious players in the content arena. Members may remember the recent contract dispute between WTHR-13 and some digital TV companies that led to a month-long blackout between the channel and two of its providers. Because these channels are becoming more aggressive in their negotiations every three years, NineStar hopes to forestall any potential issues while still helping members get the access to the channels they want to watch.

"All of our customer service representatives and support service personnel are going to be trained on OTT options so that they can help our subscribers make the decisions that work for them," Chief Technology Officer, Ross Ferson says. "We are also going to have member meetings to talk about how these options work and help people make the leap."

CONNECTIVITY IS KEY

Of course viewers using analog devices can still receive local channels for free if they want to invest in a digital converter box but for their favorite cable shows, they may want to look into a Roku or Apple TV option which can give them access to thousands of movies, and television episodes from the top free and paid channels and streaming anytime, anywhere and on any device.

"The key is connectivity," Bever said. "NineStar has worked hard to offer our members the best fiber optic connections and the highest speeds available so that they can be online, playing games or watching TV without missing a beat."

NineStar Connect does not raise their prices arbitrarily. They are committed to offering their members the best connectivity and content at the most reasonable rate and willing to help their subscribers find the best video option for their money and the tools they need to navigate the technology.

"Without a doubt we are in a transitional era of television," Painter says. "It will probably take a while for the streaming to become stream-lined and standardized because right now, it's still so experimental. Still, we are committed to helping our members find video options that are the best bet for their budget."

NINESTAR HOLDS TOWN HALL IN MAXWELL

ineStar held their second town hall meeting on December 7th at Maxwell Intermediate School. The evening opened with Chairman of the Board Jim Cherry welcoming everyone in attendance. Then Regina Bever, Vice President of Administration, discussed the Smart Hub program and gave everyone a demonstration using the web portal. Smart Hub allows for electric users to manage their energy consumption and take control when they wish to use their appliances off peak demand times. Members then asked questions which were wide ranging and answered by management staff in attendance. The evening ended with door prizes and giveaways to those in attendance. The next town hall is slated for February 15th at McCordsville Elementary and will feature a meet the candidate night. This will allow membership to meet the individuals who will be running for the board in 2018. Please check your mail towards the end of January for your invitation.

NEW SUBSTATION BEING BUILT

It comes as little surprise that McCordsville and the surrounding areas continue to grow at a fast pace. Managing the demand for electricity is something that must be planned for years in advance. In recent months, it has been determined that the time has come for a new substation to be built to keep up with new construction while maintaining safe, reliable and affordable electricity for existing customers. NineStar Connect is working alongside Wabash Valley Power Association to construct a new substation at 900 North and 500 West in Hancock County. Work has already begun on the project with a completion date set for mid to late 2018.

President's Message

often find myself in a reflective mood at year's end and this year is no exception. As 2017 winds down and before 2018 ushers itself in, let me share some of my thoughts with you.

Bigger isn't always better. By that, I mean simply that I think our community is fortunate to be served by a locally-based, locally-owned utility like NineStar Connect. To be sure, our smaller size and less dense service area means that the cost of our services can be higher; however, you will seldom see a utility that is as engaged and dedicated to a community's overall success as NineStar Connect. Everyone here at NineStar believes in a simple principle: A rising tide lifts all ships. If our community is successful, NineStar will be successful as well.

Infrastructure investment is a long-term commitment to the community. Since January 1, 2011, NineStar Connect has invested over \$60 million dollars in infrastructure in our community. That investment is less about serving our current members and customers (although it does) and more about being ready to serve our future members and customers. What many people don't realize is that NineStar has made these investments without any local or state incentives or tax abatements to do so. With 100% of our members having access to Gigabit speed fiber by 3Q, 2018, you will see NineStar begin focusing on what it can do to address water and wastewater needs in unserved areas of Hancock County in 2018 and beyond. When you combine this continued infrastructure investment with the annual \$1 million dollars that NineStar pays in local property taxes on that infrastructure, you can begin to realize that NineStar's commitment to the local community is genuine.

Returning money back to members is important to a well-run cooperative. As a not-for-profit cooperative utility, NineStar Connect allocates any profits (known as "margins" to cooperatives) back to members in form of capital credits. When it is financially prudent, it then retires those capital credits back to the members in the form of cash. Since 2011, NineStar has returned over \$2.4 million dollars to our members and just recently, our board of directors voted to return another \$500,000 to our members this December. That is another half million dollars that will stay and circulate in our local community contributing to its overall prosperity.

The quality of employees directly impacts the quality of service a company offers. NineStar Connect is blessed with having high quality, community-minded employees who provide the very best service for our members and customers. In 2017, these dedicated employees provided over 1,500 hours in community service and donated through payroll deduction nearly \$20,000 to local charities which, in turn, NineStar matched. Since NineStar is a not-forprofit utility, you have every right to expect superior service; however, I believe NineStar employees go above and beyond other utility employees by supporting the community that supports them. The heartfelt dedication of our employees is one of many things that truly distinguishes NineStar from other utilities who provide service in our local area.

Local really is the best. Everyone

knows you can't please all of the people all of the time. With that said, however, we also know that local organizations are far more effective in meeting community needs than large multi-state or even multi-national organizations. The NineStar Board of Directors has made it a strategic goal to engage members and customers more regularly to ensure that we are meeting their ever-changing needs. Something new in 2017 was our Member Town Hall nights where members and customers can come to hear what's new at the company and be able to ask questions and engage both directors and management personnel on



the operations of NineStar. In addition, NineStar also hosts regular "Nerd Nights" where we offer instruction and demonstrations of latest communications and Internet technologies which allows our members and customers to leverage their broadband and other services to their full advantage.

On behalf of all the employees and directors of NineStar Connect, I want to thank you for allowing us to serve you this past year and let you know we very much look forward to continuing to serve you, your families and businesses in the new year.

FRIENDS OF RECOVERY, TALITHA

KOUM

The Talitha Koum project is a structure that is being transformed into the future home of a residential substance-abuse facility to help the recovery of women battling addiction. \$5000 was awarded to this organization and the money will be used for the kitchen remodel (cabinets, countertops, fixtures and appliances) within the house.

FUSE INC.

The FUSE organization provides training/education programs for families that are raising children with special needs. FUSE stands for "Families United for Support and Encouragement". The ORU board decided to provide \$5000 to this organization which will be used for their operating costs, referral services and program staffing. Programs include parent meetings, Dads group, training for youth transitioning into adult services, adaptive swim program, color guard performance group, among others.

HANCOCK COUNTY CHILDREN'S CHOIR

This organization has grown leaps and bounds with quadrupling the

number of participants since its first semester. The children's choir is a grass roots choral performance and education program dedicated to create musical opportunities for youth through a variety of music. This program also teaches their choir members etiquette, public speaking, vocal production and stage presence. This program was given \$2500 this quarter.

LOVE INC. OF HANCOCK COUNTY

\$3000 was awarded to the Love Inc. program. Love Inc. works with area churches along with the programs

they provide to assist members of our community. The programs include providing assistance such as financial and transportation aid, furniture needs, life-skill workshops such as cooking and job interview skills and mentoring and relationship advice. All of the services they provide is through love and the name of Christ.

MT. VERNON MUSIC BOOSTERS NOT PICTURED

The Mt. Vernon Music Boosters work to raise money to help support the band and choir programs at Mt. Vernon schools. With the \$1000 that Operation Round Up provided them, they will be purchasing a Marimba for their music program.

They were awarded \$2,235.90 for the purchase of a Fatal Vision Roadster and three pairs of Fatal Vision Goggles that will help assimilate a person who is impaired and driving.

\$3000 was given to the Simmons Cemetery Association. The funds will be used for historic preservation and archival data through digital mapping and ground penetrating radar. It will also be used toward restoration of some of the gravestones at the cemetery.

It is a learning experience with measured results to gauge impact. 


DEBBIE ROBERTS MEMORY PRESERVED WITH PLAQUE



CAPITAL CREDIT CHECKS

t's that time of the year again when NineStar mails out capital credit checks; and, if you haven't already, you should be receiving your check soon. The check(s) you will be receiving are for profits that were allocated to your patronage account as a member of NineStar Connect. Profits are allocated to the members and are pro-rated based upon each member's purchase of electric and/or telecommunications services.

Over the last 5 years, NineStar has been able to make over \$46 million in capital investments in critical electrical and fiber optic infrastructure while still being able to retire over \$13 million of long term debt. During that same period, the company has returned over \$2 million in cash to members in the form of capital credit retirements.



Any member in good standing residing in districts 3, 4, or 5 is eligible to run for a district position and any member residing in districts 1, 2, 7, 8, or 10 may run for the At-Large #2 position on the board of directors. Any member interested in running for a board position should contact Kim Gerard or Regina Bever at the Main Street Office (317) 326-3131 or via e-mail: administration@ninestarconnect.com and request an Information Guide for Potential Directors.
